After Season-Ending Heartbreak, Tigers Are 2B Favorites

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It's been nine months, and Deacon Parker is still losing sleep over the last football game he played.

"I stay up every night thinking about it," he said. "I just think about how I could've done my friends better, how I could've made it better for Keith (Olson) or Gavin (Parker) or Lucas (Dahl) or Glade (Shannon) or anyone, because I know that I didn't do my best in it. It still haunts me to this day."

He's not the only Napavine player in a similar bind. Safe to say, these Tigers don't forget easily.

They don't forget the eight-point lead with six minutes to go at Harry E. Lang Stadium last December. They don't forget Gavin Parker getting stuffed

in his own end zone for a safety, or Jackson Esary plunging into the end zone, first for a touchdown and then for the go-ahead two-point conversion. And they certainly don't forget the sight of Kalama raising the 2B state championship trophy on the other end of the field after coming oh-so-close to glory.

They stung through the off-season and into spring ball, and remembered throughout the summer.

"I think everybody still thinks about what happened last year," Cael Stanley said. "It keeps a chip on everybody's shoulder to come out and play hard and play for each other."

Now, after oh so long of remembering and stewing, nine months later, the Tigers finally get a chance to make things right the only way you can af-

ter coming in second place in heartbreaking fashion.

"We want to focus on what's in front of us and how we can get better," head coach Josh Fay said. "But our ultimate goal is to see if we can get back to that game and have a different outcome."

They're certainly in a prime spot to do so. Despite losing a Pac-12 lineman in Keith Olson, two first-team all-league skill players in Dahl and Gavin Parker, and a big receiving threat in Shannon, Napavine is set to return about as many starters as the other three state semifinalists from last fall combined.

That includes the man running it all on offense, with Demarest coming back for his second stint as a starting quarterback after earning first-team all-C2BL North Division hon-

ors last fall.

"I think I'm more in shape," the junior said. "I'm hungrier than ever. I just want to get back to the top."

Stanley, who himself earned a second-team all-league nod as the Tigers' No. 2 back in 2021, will get a go at being the starring rusher this season, bulking up on the carries and — Napavine hopes — the yards.

Those two will be operating behind a line that loses the reigning C2BL North Offensive Player of the Year (Olson) and two more first-team blockers (Scott Burdick and Deven Searles) but returns a third in Deacon Parker and a second-teamer in Gabe Harris, and has the depth to fill out.

"Every guy that's going to start on that offensive line has

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Experienced Group of Bearcats Motivated for Improved 2022

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Last year saw the W.F. West football team make its deepest run in the postseason in some time, earning a state berth for the first time since 2017 before going one-and-done in a tight loss with Prosser.

This year, the Bearcats have grander plans.

"They're chomping at the bit, there's been a different motivation in this group than the last couple of years," coach Dan Hill said. "They're going to have a good opportunity. They have some goals set and they're going to go week-to-week."

W.F. West hasn't won a state playoff game since a deep run in 2012 that saw the Bearcats make it all the way to the semifinals.

With 17 returning starters from last year's squad, the Bearcats feel pretty good about where they stand in 2022. 2A Evergreen Conference Offensive MVP Gavin Fugate returns at quarterback, and league Defensive MVP Daniel Matagi returns to anchor the line.

Fugate has a whole cast of receivers and playmakers to throw to, including Cameron Amoroso and sophomore Gage Brumfield. Matagi isn't alone on defense either, with Blake Ely returning at linebacker and an experienced line that includes William Buzzard leading the charge in the trenches.

It could be the perfect storm for the Bearcats, who are looking to dethrone a Tumwater squad that have had a stranglehold on the league, and state, for years. Hill and his staff saw the opportunity for a strong season, and loaded up their non-league schedule with defending 2A champ Lynden, 1A runner-up Eatonville, and Greater St. Helens League champion Ridgefield. "That was the plan," Hill said. "We know we have a team

that can play, we're going to be tough. We know we're going to have an opportunity to have a playoff team. We wanted these guys to have an opportunity to see some high level teams from the get-go."

And though it seems the expectations are raised every year in Chehalis, the Bearcats have the returning production, system, and new playmakers to make some noise in their eyes.

"More than anything this is the strongest team physically I've been a part of the last four years," Matagi said. "It'll be one of the best seasons W.F. West is going to have."

Tigers Turn the Page With Renewed Belief Under New Coach

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Before new Centralia football coach Dustin McGee made the cross country trek from Tennessee back to the Pacific Northwest, he did everything he could to hit the ground running.

It's been quite awhile since the Tigers have competed with the likes of the Tumwaters and W.F. Wests of the 2A Evergreen Conference. Centralia has had just two winning seasons since 2012, and has lost the Swamp Cup to its rival Bearcats 13 seasons in a row.

So the first step in coming to rebuild a program is getting the Tigers to believe that they can beat anyone on their schedule.

"I just want the kids to believe in themselves," McGee said. "It's been a long time since Centralia's been on the map athletically. We have a whole new regime in the high school, it's exciting.

"We're trying to instill belief

in these guys, there's a lot of talent in our high school. It's just guys believing in who they are and who we are as coaches and trying to do things right from day one, and being consistent year-in and year-out."

And while it might be unreasonable to expect a huge leap in the first year of McGee's run as

the Tigers coach, the Hub City squad is bringing back a good chunk of experience.

Landen Jenkins will return at quarterback, and Gabe Seymour and Mikey Hoyt earned praise from their new coach for how they've approached the summer and fall camp so far.

McGee also credited the of-

fensive line for taking on the challenge in the weight room during the offseason.

In a top-heavy EvCo that features favorites Tumwater and W.F. West nipping at the T-Birds' heels, the Tigers are hoping to put together a good start to the season before league play begins.

"It'll be exciting for us to see that and get to know all the teams in our league," McGee said. "Everything I've heard about this league is that it's really competitive. We're looking forward to it."

Warriors Confident in Quick Reload

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On the outside looking in, it would appear the Rochester football team is losing a lot.

Talon Betts, an all-league and all-area pick last year who racked up all-purpose yards like they were nothing and was a standout at safety, is playing in Cheney for Eastern Washington this fall. Landon Hawes, an all-league standout at quarterback, has also graduated.

But despite some unproven offensive production, the Warriors return a lot of leaders and playmakers from a strong year last season.

Four seniors will get action in the backfield for the Warriors this season, and they return over half of their defensive starters. Though Betts and Hawes' production will be hard to replace with two players, the Warriors have a group of players that can fill in those roles in different ways.

In coach AJ Easley's third

year at the helm, this is exactly what he envisioned his team would look like.

"It just builds on itself, the more success you have, the more people want to come out," Easley said. "When you are successful and do things right, people want to be a part of it. Our middle school numbers are through the roof and our youth programs are through the roof. We've gotten more people on board because we're doing things the right way and building our culture."

Tate Quarnstrom and Brady Baird return and will feature heavily in the backfield, with Baird, in particular, earning high praise for his leadership from Easley.

On the line, Owen Gillespie and Jaden Nichols will anchor a line that is more experienced than its been in recent memory. Palmer Watt will continue to feature at the fullback spot for the Warriors.

Returning from injury and fresh off a stellar baseball season,

Braden Hartley will also return to the gridiron at wide receiver, giving the Warriors an intriguing outside threat.

No matter the personnel, however, Easley is content with the culture that's already been built in just three years, and how it could grow this year and beyond.

"We're not trying to do anything special, we're just trying to stick with what we've always had," Easley said.

It's a New Year and a Very New Group at Tumwater

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The road back to success for the Tumwater football team won't be as simple as rolling the same team out onto the field and expecting similar results.

Instead, after graduating 30 seniors for the third straight season, the Thunderbirds have undergone a much more thorough reloading process, with plenty of new bodies scattered all over the field.

"As coaches, we realize that we have a lot of guys that have had limited playing time, so it takes a little bit longer, but the standard doesn't change," coach Bill Beattie said. "What we expect out of those kids is the same as any other group that's come here. As coaches, we've had to be a little bit more understanding, take them through a little bit more, spend a little bit more time talking and chalking."

Beattie estimated that the number of sophomores playing meaningful minutes could hit double-figures easily. But with nearly the entire lineup in turnover, even many of the upperclassmen are in a similar position to the 10th graders, stepping into a starting role for the first time.

"They're doing a good job," Beattie said. "A lot of them are in the same boat. They're looking at starting for the first time, so their reps are very valuable as well."

The good news for the T-Birds starts with a couple familiar faces that are back. Alex Overbay is well-versed in the offense and ready for another year as Tumwater's starting quarter-

back, and Carlos Matheney, who spent 2021 as the second option to Payton Hoyt, will slot into the fullback role as the ground game's primary weapon.

"Inherently in the Wing-T, the fullback is the guy," Beattie said. "He's typically going to get more carries than anybody else. However, the great thing is that if that's who you focus on, there's two or three other guys who are going to get the ball and go."

The new-look Thunderbirds will have to grow up in a hurry, going from a Week 1 matchup with Burlington-Edison to a Week 2 showdown against 2A state semifinalist North Kitsap, with a trip to 3A Kelso wrapping up the non-league portion of its schedule.

"Our young guys are going to get valuable experience, and then Week 5, we'll have another top-10 team in Chehalis coming to play," Beattie said. "If nothing else, we're going to get quality reps and quality experience that will make those young guys grow up in a hurry."

Wolves Looking Up Going Into Second Year Under Baldwin

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It's just Year 2 of the Garrett Baldwin era at Black Hills — and Year 1 did not end spectacularly in terms of the final record — but the second-year head coach can already see things moving in the right direction for the Wolves.

"It's a much different group, a much better group," he said.

Focusing on culture as much as anything early on in his tenure, a tough first fall turned into a productive spring and summer, leading to a chance for Black Hills to get right back in the thick of things in the 2A Evergreen Conference.

And — in Baldwin's eyes — hopefully stay there for awhile.

"For us at Black Hills, if you look at our history, we are inconsistent," Baldwin said. "The program's history has had two-year, three-year stretches where you get winning seasons and trips to the playoffs. We're just trying to fix that. And that is hard. But the way that we're trying to go about it is just convincing the kids that it's possible."

The Wolves will try to make that breakthrough with a core that went through the struggle of a 1-8 season, but is back with the goal of being the group that rights the ship.

Jaxsen Beck, who started under center immediately for the Wolves as a freshman last year, is back for his second stint under center.

"He's quiet, he leads by example," Baldwin said.

Meanwhile, Johnnie Stall-

ings returns to start at tailback, after running his way onto the 2A EvCo second team in 2021. Baldwin said that Braiden Bond is close behind him, though, and that both will feature in Black Hills' run-first offense.

"They can be a good double-headed snake," he said.

Last year, the Wolves' lone win came against Centralia in league play, with two non-league losses to 3A schools. This time around, the slate gets easier on paper — at least following a tough matchup with 1A Montesano — with non-league games against 1A Elma and 3A North Thurston, both of which had losing seasons in 2021.

But it'll be up to the Wolves themselves to take that next step.

"We've got a lot of leadership in this group," Baldwin said. "We've got a pretty solid amount of returning starters that were part of the 1-8 (team), but now they're the seniors, and they're realizing how much they can change if they change their habits."

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Onalaska Takes New Core into New Season

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Following its long, winding, and uphill road last fall, the Onalaska football team is hoping its next wave of Loggers get a slightly more predictable road this year.

Not that “predictable” means anything close to “easy” when you’re in the Central 2B League.

“It’s gonna be tough,” head coach Mazen Saade said. “We’ve got to put some things together and see where we shake out in the league.”

Between tough scheduling, cancellations, and last-minute re-schedules, the Loggers got to stake their claim as possibly the best six-loss team in Washington history in 2021, with three of those defeats coming against 2B championship game teams, two coming to top-10 1A schools, and one against an Oregon 3A power. At the outset this year, there’s only one cross-classification matchup on the docket — a Sept. 23 showdown with Tenino — to go along with an always-loaded C2BL slate, and the ever-present cross-divisional showdown with Napavine.

Taking this challenge on will be a whole lot of new faces, after the Loggers graduated nearly all of their ball carriers and most of their line.

Up front, Onalaska will turn to Rylan McGraw to lead the way, with Parker Haskins and Tommy Hornsby III also slotting into key spots and the usual

wave of hard-nosed underclassmen behind them chomping at the bit to hit someone.

“It’s a mindset,” Saade said of his group’s penchant for reloading on the line. “Our kids get pretty excited about it. We don’t do a lot of zone blocking here. We’re not like the typical team that’s going to zone block you, kick step, and pass-drop. We’re going to come at you and try to block you.”

Behind that front will be one junior returner and a whole lot of sophomores. Kayden Mzingo is back to take the snaps and make the reads a quarterback, quickly going from the

least-experienced face in the backfield to the stout veteran of the group.

He’ll be facilitating a stable of backs that Saade hopes to move around as needed, with Case McGraw starting at fullback and Rodrigo Rodriguez, Blaze Underhill, and Cooper Lawrence set to get the pitches.

“We’ve got to grow up in a hurry,” Saade said. “All of us, we’ve got to mature every single day, and that doesn’t matter if we’re playing with a bunch of seniors or a bunch of freshmen or a bunch of sophomores or a bunch of juniors.”

and one league one — but the Beavers and the Titans are the way to go here. Both teams are trending up, with Tenino coming off a State quarterfinal run and PWV returning a good deal of its squad, and while the Titans will be the underdogs, they’ll have a real chance to announce themselves as real contenders come 2B league play time.

There are a couple big 2A matchups in the area, but when the Tigers play the Loggers, that’s always the place to be. Napavine comes into this season with wind and words filling its sail, picked by many as the team to beat in the 2B ranks this fall after bringing back most of the team that came a few minutes away from a state title last year. Onalaska, meanwhile, has a bit more retooling to do from its semifinal squad, but won’t have any issues getting itself ready for what’s become one of the best rivalries in Lewis County. Expect plenty of bad feelings, at least one attack on school rocks, and a whole lot of hard hits here.

Also keep an eye on: Lynden at W.F. West, North Kitsap at Tumwater, Pe Ell-Willapa Valley at Adna

Week 3: Tumwater at Kelso

A week after hosting another team that made the 2A semifinals last fall, Tumwater will get a test of a different sort when it goes for a climb up the classification ladder in Cowlitz County. Tumwater’s built up its reputation with a physical ground game, but the Thunderbirds will be tested by the Hilanders, who bring back one of the larger lines in Southwest Washington with heappings of experience.

Also keep an eye on: Black Hills at Rochester, Tenino vs. Klahowya (Saturday at Lumen Field)

Week 4: Tenino at Onalaska

Last season’s matchup on the Black Top had just about everything — save passing yards — with Tenino coming back from a 14-0 deficit thanks to its bruising rushing attack and possibly the defensive play of the year by Dylan Spicer. This time around, the Loggers will be looking for revenge at home.

Also keep an eye on: Rainier at Morton-White Pass.

Week 5: W.F. West at Tumwater

There’s a good feeling going around the W.F. West parts of town with Gavin Fugate leading the charge offensively and

Glass, Ranney Back to Lead Toledo Backfield

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In 2021, Toledo entered the fall with a backfield lacking just about any game experience, and left it with a 10-3 record and a run in the state tournament.

So the Riverhawks could be excused for being excited about returning a couple starting backs this time around.

Senior Geoffrey Glass returns for his second season as the primary dive man in the option attack at fullback, after leading Toledo in carries and rushing yards as a junior. If that’s not a good enough familiar sight for Riverhawk fans, he’ll also have fellow senior Zane Ranney leading the way again, along with getting more touches of his own at tailback.

“Having those two, it helps a lot,” head coach Mike Christensen said. “Especially with blocking; that’s a big part of what we do. Just getting the kids to know who to block and when, that’s always a headache. But if you have a returning running back, that really, really helps. Especially a kid like Zane, who was a great blocker for us last year.”

Those two — who will both also feature heavily on the defensive end — will take a significant weight off the shoulders of first-year quarterback Austin Norris.

Norris, who started his career as a split end for the Riverhawks, is the latest in a long line of players Christensen tabbed to play quarterback their final year at Toledo. Last season, Wyatt Nef turned his lone season as

past, but I think we have more of that this year. We have a little more depth there, but inexperience. I think when those get experience they’ll be really good football players for us.”

a starting signal-caller into an all-area campaign with 29 total touchdowns, setting the standard for Norris this coming fall.

“He’s good,” Christensen said. “He still has some room to grow, but I think he’s got a good overall grasp of the offense, and he’s worked hard over the summer. I’m seeing about what I expected for now, which is good.”

Up front, Toledo will have to find new players to make holes
