Champion Napavine Girls Basketball Team Honored By City Council



Lewis County Commissioners Celebrate Napavine's Basketball State Title

After securing the first state title in program history, the Napavine girls basketball team was lauded by the Lewis County Board of Commissioners March 12 as "one of those classic examples of where teamwork makes the dream work."

"Because none of you could get to this level without everyone else working together," Commissioner Lindsey Pollock said as the team was formally recognized by the county commissioners at the Lewis County Courthouse.

"We are so appreciative, and thank you for bringing home a state championship to Lewis County," Commissioner Scott Brummer said.

A game-winning 3-pointer by sophomore Hayden Kaut with 16.6 seconds on the clock lifted the Tigers over Okanogan for their first 2B State Championship in program history on Saturday, March 2, with the Tigers ending the game on a 5-0 run to clinch the trophy at the Spokane Arena.

"For us, it was a dream, I think, when the buzzer went off. When Hayden Kaut hit that 3, it became a hard reality," Napavine coach Shane Schutz said Tuesday. "And a really good reality of what these kids accomplished."

While the shot secured a championship trophy for Navapine, the commissioners further cemented Kaut's place in Napavine athletics history with a plaque. "I've probably watched that shot 20 times, and it's just amazing because it was a tough game. You were double-teamed almost the entire game," Commissioner Sean Swope said. "But when it mattered most, you came through. You were clutch. That's how legends are made."


Standing in the commissioners' chambers on March 12, Schutz noted a portrait of the late Lewis County Commissioner Gary Stamper, who led the Mossyrock Vikings girls basketball team to a state 2B Championship in 2007. Stamper died from COVID-19 while still in office in 2021.

"He and I coached against each other for several years and had great battles on the court," Schutz said. "To be able to be the next Washington team to follow his success, it's an honor."

Coaching for more than two decades, Schutz said the team's camaraderie and "family approach" stands out.

"I'm very proud of what they've accomplished, and I'm really happy to be able to accomplish this after everything they've gone through," Schutz said.

Kaut's Game-Winner Lifts Napavine To First State Championship

SPOKANE — Thirty seconds left in a two-point game. The Tigers needed a clutch shot. Everyone knew Hayden Kaut would come through.

"No doubt at all," Dakota Hamilton said.

The C2BL first-teamer came through with the biggest shot in program history, a game-winning three-pointer with 16.6 seconds left. The shot propelled the Tigers to a 41-40 win over Okanogan, a victory that clinched their first 2B state title in school history.

"It felt unreal," Kaut said. "It's taken a lot of years for our team to get here."

The Tigers had been to the state title game three times in school history prior to March 2, but lost each time. Napavine coach Shane Schutz was the head coach for two of those finals, back-to-back losses in 2008 and 2009.

"I'm in a fog," Schutz said. "I'm just in awe right now. I'm on cloud nine."

Kaut's shot was the second-to-last sequence of a wild final few minutes, one where Napavine committed several turnovers and allowed a five-point lead to shift into a four-point deficit with 90 seconds remaining.

The only play that followed Kaut's three was a final

Okanogan three-point attempt, one that sailed long before the final buzzer sounded.

"Just immediately happy tears," Hamilton said. "It was the most amazing feeling ever."

Kaut got the Tigers back within two with just over a minute remaining. After an Okanogan timeout, they got a defensive stop and executed a play that they've been working on for months. Kaut added that they even went over the play again earlier on Saturday for nearly 20 minutes.

The Bulldogs defended it well, as Okanogan's Aleena Lafferty stuck by Kaut's side as she streaked across the middle to the right wing. Lafferty even had a hand in Kaut's face for a moment, but a pump fake bought Kaut the space she needed to pull the trigger.

"That kid can shoot threes," Schutz said. "That's a big shot for a sophomore."

Prior to the final few minutes, it was Hamilton doing most of the damage for the Tigers. She scored 10 of Napavine's 19 first-half points, and she added five more in the second half to finish with a team-high 15. She also grabbed seven rebounds and notched two assists.

Schutz noted that Hamilton has no fear and is not afraid to shoot, and her willingness to step up as a leader helped the Tigers get over the hump. The win was extra sweet for Hamilton, who had to work back from an ACL injury that she suffered last season to take the court for her senior season.

"It's just so amazing," Hamilton said. "I missed out on last year, and I was struggling a little bit to find my groove. It's just so awesome to finally connect and be in this position right now."

It wasn't just Hamilton and Kaut, as Keira O'Neill scored 10 points and grabbed nine rebounds, while Taylen Evander added six points, three rebounds, three steals and two assists.

With the win, the Tigers became the first school from the west side to win the 2B girls title since Mossyrock did so in 2007.

Schutz recalled several battles against Mossyrock in that era, many of which came against former Mossyrock girls coach Gary Stamper.

"To be the next team on the west side to do it and follow him, it's a complete honor," Schutz said.

Hamilton and O'Neill were two of four Napavine seniors. Grace Gall was on the floor as the final buzzer celebrated, but Avery Schutz was watching from the bench. She tore her ACL in December, and has been supporting from the side ever since.

In the moments following the win, she was visibly emotional, and amidst the celebration, she and her father shared a long embrace.

Kaut's elation turned to sadness when she realized it was her last time sharing the floor with her senior teammates, a mix of emotions that made even the most thrilling of victories a bittersweet moment.

"We knew that this was their final time with us," Kaut said. "They've helped build our culture and our program throughout the years. It feels really good to win for them."

Schutz knows that as time goes on, the importance of the victory will sink in more and more.

And as the years go on, he and all of Napavine will remember this team as one of the best in the school's history.

"I'm really proud of them," Schutz said. "It's a special, special group ... I thought we were one of eight teams that had a chance to win it. You just don't believe it until you do it."



Instant: Napavine Tops Okanogan to Win 2B State Title

In the biggest moment of perhaps the Napavine girls basketball team's history, Hayden Kaut delivered a gamewinning 3-pointer to lift the Tigers to their first 2B state championship in program history on Saturday, March 2, over Okanogan. The Tigers scored the final five points of the game to win 41-40 and clinch the trophy.

Turnovers far outnumbered the points early in the first quarter, as both teams turned it over a combined seven times before any tallies hit the scoreboard. Dakota Hamilton finally gave Napavine its first bucket with a jumper 3 minutes and 26 seconds in.

The lids were eventually lifted from both baskets, as the Tigers converted on multiple trips, including a Hamilton triple. After leading 12-6 through the first quarter, the Bulldogs raced in front with 10 unanswered points, including two 3-pointers from Jacey Boesel. Hamilton drilled her second 3-pointer just before the halftime buzzer to push the Tigers back into the lead, 19-18, at the break. She led all scorers with 10 points in the first half.

Okanogan retook the lead early in the third before Napavine closed the third quarter with a 13-2 run. The Tigers took their biggest lead of the night thanks to a triple from Jessie McCoy and a layup from Keira O'Neill, giving them a 34-26 lead entering the fourth quarter. Napavine's defense forced 15 Okanogan turnovers through the first three quarters.

The feisty Bulldogs made it interesting early in the fourth, blitzing the Tigers with five forced turnovers and a 9-1 run to draw within a point. Camryn Ashworth lit up the Okanogan crowd with a putback layup to give the Bulldogs a 37-36 lead. Addison Brown's triple after yet another Napavine turnover pushed the lead to four with 81 seconds left.

Kaut banked in a layup to make it 40-38 with just over a minute remaining, and the Tigers' defense forced a shot clock violation with 30 seconds left. She then delivered a cold-blooded 3-pointer with 13.5 seconds left to put Napavine back in front, 41-40. Kaut had only scored three points before the two late field goals.


Charlee Buchert's desperation heave fell short for Okanogan, and the Tigers rushed the floor as they celebrated their first state championship in program history. Napavine finished its banner season with a 25-3 record and hoisted the first-place trophy in its 17th appearance in the state tournament.

The Napavine girls basketball team never let Kalama get off the ground Thursday, January 25, rolling to a 63-20 win in their final home game of the regular season.

"This was a special night for our seniors and I thought all the girls played hard in order to send them out (with) a victory tonight," Napavine coach Shane Schutz said.

Senior Keira O'Neill finished with 14 points, six rebounds, three assists and three blocks, while Dakota Hamilton had 10 points and a team-high seven boards and Grace Gall led the hosts with nine steals.

Napavine even got Avery Schutz — who suffered a season-ending injury earlier this winter — in for a few seconds of gametime on her senior night.

Hayden Kaut led the Tigers (17-1, 10-1 C2BL) with 18 points and also had six rebounds.

The Napavine defense held Kalama to five points or fewer in each of the first three quarters. The Tigers forced 35 turnovers and turned those into 40 points, and also scored 12 second-chance points off of 17 offensive rebounds.

Tigers Shut Down Mountaineers To Win Second-Straight District Title

All season long, Napavine, Rainier, and Adna jostled for position atop the C2BL standings. While the Pirates came away with the league title, it was the Tigers and Mountaineers left standing in the 2B District 4 Tournament.

Both defenses excelled throughout in the district title game on Saturday, February 17, but it was Napavine that found enough answers to come away with a 46-39 win to win their second-straight district title.

"I told them I thought we were the best team in the county," Napavine coach Shane Schutz said.

"I thought we were the best team on the west side. I just told them that and they kept grinding all season. We were successful tonight."

It wasn't often pretty, as the Tigers had to slug through a poor first half in which they scored just 16 points. Defensively, Napavine (21-2) did just as well as Rainier (22-3), however, limiting the Mountaineers to just 18.

Hayden Kaut took over immediately to start the third, as she scored nine points in a Napavine 10-0 run that gave the Tigers an eight-point lead. Kaut went on to finish with a game-high 19 points while shooting 8 for 12 from the field. "That's what makes her one of the top elite players in the league," Schutz said. "She's a gamer. She puts a lot of time in, and we needed her to do that tonight. The kids fed off that, it gave them some confidence."

In the second half, as a team, the Tigers shot 65 percent from the floor, more than doubling their mark from the first half. It was enough to hold off a Rainier squad that got as close as five points in the fourth quarter, but didn't have enough to complete the comeback.

Keira O'Neill finished with 11 points, seven rebounds and two blocks, while Dakota Hamilton added six points and six assists and Taylen Evander scored eight points and tallied three assists.

"You're not gonna shoot good every night, but you're gonna have to defend," Schutz said. "We hit some shots tonight, but that's what we hang our hat on. I thought the kids did a great job tonight."

Shots just weren't falling for the Mountaineers on their end, as they shot just 33 percent from the floor, including an 8 for 26 mark in the second half.

While they finished one win shy of their first district championship in over a decade, Rainier coach Brandon Eygabroad said that there's a lot to be proud of heading into the state tournament.

"We came out and competed every night, and went through some good teams to get here," Eygabroad said. "They're definitely feeling it, but we've got to bounce back ... There's no time to feel sorry for ourselves."


Angelica Askey scored 14 points to lead the Mountaineers, and Brooklynn Swenson was close behind with 13. Askey also led the team with six rebounds, and Bryn Beckman added three points and three steals.

At 21-2, the Tigers became one of the top seeds in the upcoming state tournament. While Schutz acknowledged that starting February 18, everyone is zero and zero again, he'll be sure to celebrate while he has the chance.

"We live for these moments," Schutz said. "It's hard to win back-to-back. We take this with real sincerity. This is awesome, and we're gonna enjoy it tonight."
